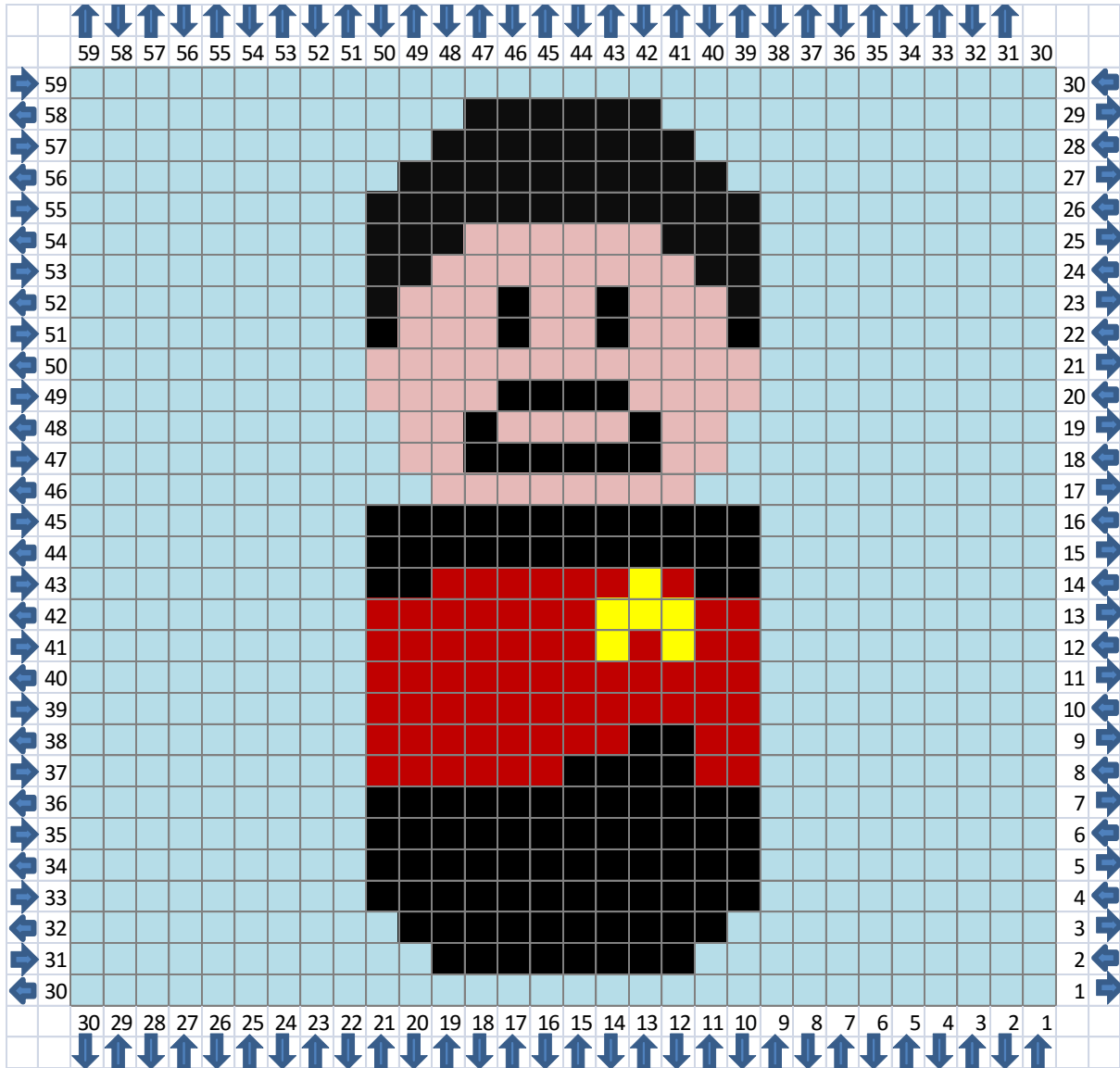


Star Trek blanket – William Riker, by Nerdish Delights.

Edging and finishing

Once you have completed your panel, you can continue on with the edging to save time when it comes to joining the panels later. After your final stitch to join the last block, chain 3 and then single stitch through the gap between the next blocks. Continue all the way around until you have edged all sides. When joining the panels later, you can use your joining method of choice with the chains you've just added. I also recommend weaving in ends once you've finished a panel, so you don't have a huge pile to work through at the end. I hate weaving them in, but it must be done!
